

Pastor's Paragraph

King Jehoshaphat's Prayer

King Jehoshaphat was generally a good king over Judah. He led a revival among the people, encouraging them to return to God. When faced with a national crisis (surrounded by an enemy army!) he gathered the multitude together in the court of God's temple in Jerusalem and led a prayer meeting. His prayer is one of the most memorable prayers recorded in the scriptures. His heartfelt supplication to God is extremely timely and relevant for our situation today. First, he affirmed his absolute trust in the Almighty God. Then, he prayed these words, "If disaster comes upon us—sword, judgment, pestilence, or famine—we will stand before this temple and in Your presence (for Your name is in this temple), and cry out to You in our affliction, and You will hear and save." (2 Chronicles 20:9) Basically, he was acknowledging the sovereignty of God and accepting whatever fate God allowed. No matter what happened (notice the possibility of a *pestilence*!), he would stand in God's temple and continue to worship the God who saves. That should be our response to the covid-19 pandemic. No matter what happens, we will return to church and worship our Almighty Savior!

The key concept is that of trust. Jehoshaphat trusted God. Notice what he did not do. He did not summon his military commanders to come up with a plan to protect his city. He did not convene a panel of scientific experts to analyze the situation and formulate a scientific solution. He did not call for an economic council to invest in infrastructure to defend against the enemy. He did not even call the priests to get a religious perspective. He just went straight to God, the One in whom he trusted completely. It was a humble admission that even the King could not save his own people. He needed some divine intervention. (It would be nice to have a politician demonstrate some humility like that every once in a while!) His prayer ends with another great line, "O our God, will You not judge them? For we have no power against this great multitude that is coming against us; nor do we know what to do, but our eyes are upon You." He humbly admitted that he had no idea what to do, but his eyes were fixed upon the One Who Saves. I'm sure Jehoshaphat was surrounded by competent military officers and brilliant scientists and shrewd economists. But, they could not save him from this enemy. And, so it is with us. We should not wait for the government to save us. We should not put our trust in the scientific experts. We have a great health-care system, but it will not be our salvation when we really need it. But no matter what dangers we face, we can stand in the presence of God with absolute confidence.

The good news is that we will be able to do just that in the month of May! Sunday, May 10th will be a busy day! It will be the first Sunday that we are able to engage in our normal public worship services (following the new guidelines!). On May 10th, we will have Sunday School, celebrate Mother's Day, Honor our Graduates, and have a baptism service. You can tell that we have been isolated too long! We really need to get back to church! We will still plan to live-stream the preaching service on Facebook for those who are not yet prepared to risk public encounters. For those who are ready, I can't wait to see you in God's House! God is good . . . All the time. ~Pastor
